

Injury Prevention: Unintentional firearm injury-related emergency department visits among Kentucky youth aged 10 and under



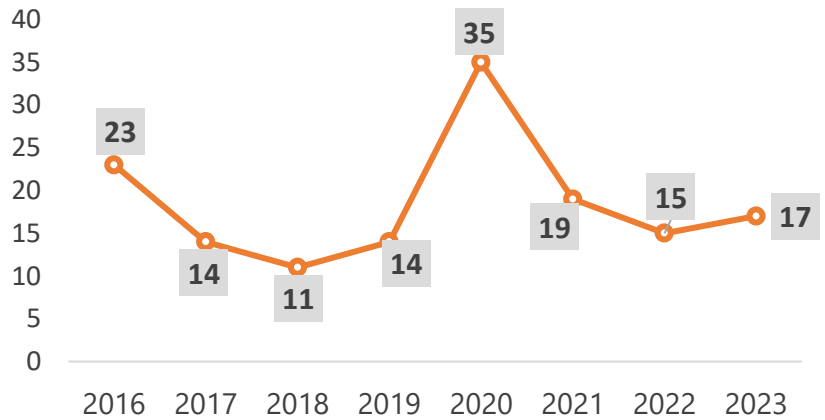
Youth can gain access to firearms within the home, at a friend's house, in the neighborhood, or at school. Kids are naturally curious and may decide to play with the gun, even if warned not to. Playing with firearms is dangerous and may result in unintended firearm injury or death.

Annually, an average of **19 emergency department (ED) visits*** for unintentional firearm injuries occurred among Kentucky youth¹ from 2016–2023.

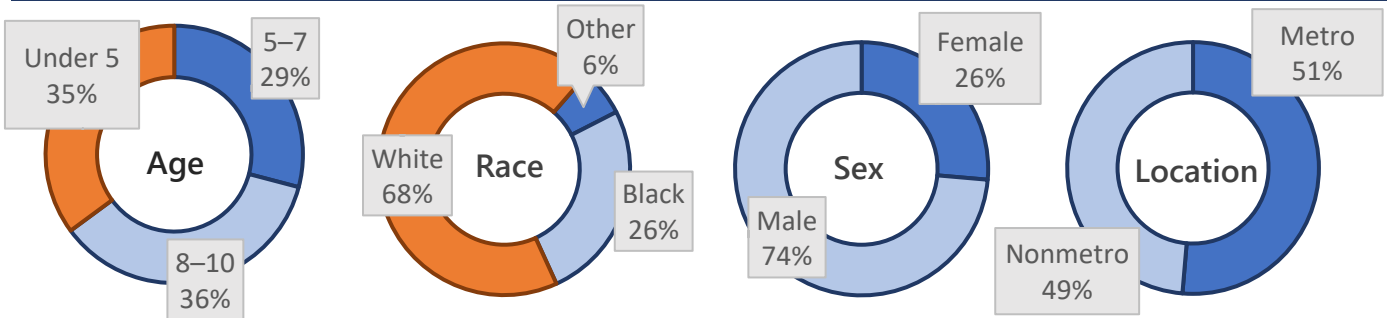
¹For this brief, youth are defined as Kentucky residents aged 10 and under.

\$ The median cost per ED visit from 2016–2023 was **\$2,849**.

Unintentional firearm injury ED visits among Kentucky youth by age group, race, sex, and location³, 2016–2023



Of all unintentional firearm injury ED visits involving youth from 2016–2023 ($n=148$), **72%** were male, **68%** were white, and **51%** were from metro areas.

²The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic that started in 2020 should be considered when interpreting data and trend analyses.

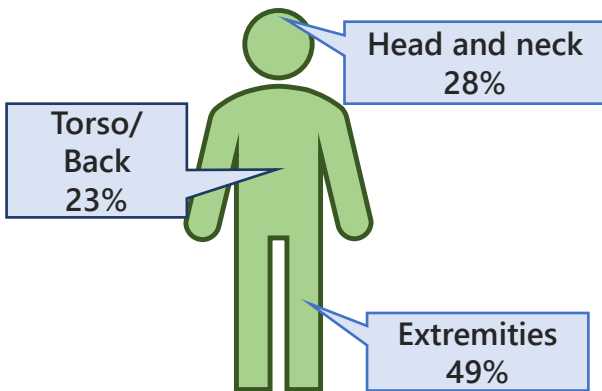
³Location is defined as metro (counties containing metropolitan statistical areas with populations of 50,000 or higher) and nonmetro (those with less than 50,000 in any urban cluster population) per the 2013 National Center for Health Statistics urban–rural classification.

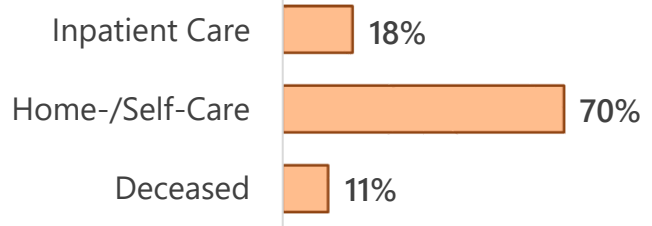
Unintentional firearm injury ED cases among Kentucky youth by body region⁴ of injury and discharge status, 2016–2023

The most common unintentional youth firearm injuries⁴ seen in the ED were open wounds (**72%**), followed by fractures (**11%**) and superficial injuries or contusions (**7%**).

Prevention Tips



Always assume a firearm is loaded.

Don't play with a firearm, and never point it at anyone, including yourself.



Store firearms up and away. Keep them locked up and unloaded.

Talk to kids about firearms and firearm safety. Teach and frequently remind them that the gun violence they see on TV or in video games is not real or acceptable.
