## **Teen Distracted Driving**

involves taking one's eyes off the road, hands off the wheel, or mind off driving.¹ The consequences can be deadly. It's hard to know the number of people who drive distracted, but one way to get an idea is through self-reported data, like with the Kentucky High School Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS). According to YRBS data, the number of high school students self-reporting phone use while driving increased significantly from 2019 through 2023.²
